### Arlington High School Senior chosen as a Military Child of the Year semi-finalist

Arlington High School (AHS) Senior, Matthew Suce, was chosen as a semifinalist for the national Operation Homefront Military Child of the Year.

Matthew was a member of the AHS National Honor Society, Key Club, Future Business Leaders of America, and Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps. Through these groups and on his own, he has collected food for the poor, helped the elderly, and volunteered at community events. While he didn't make it to the final selection, his focus remains on helping others.

"I really like to help individuals in need," said Matthew. "Through servant leadership, I can bring positive changes to my community."

He has enlisted in the Washington National Guard and will also attend Central Washington University starting in the winter quarter. He will be part of the Reserve Officer Training Corp at the university and plans to join the Army after college and major in Army aviation.

"I was really honored to be part of the signing ceremony," said Sabrina, a junior at AHS. "It was nice to have military families recognized."

Volunteerism is a big part of the Suce family. Matthew and Sabrina's mother, Nohelia who is a substitute teacher in Arlington Public Schools, was the 2018 Washington National Guard Spouse of the Year. Her husband, Junior Suce, is a U.S. Army Training Non-Commissioned Officer. The family was based at Joint Base Lewis-McChord in Lakewood, moved to Puyallup, and relocated to Arlington in November of 2018.

"The Suce family is very involved in educating their community about military culture and the transition from active duty to the National Guard," said Robbin Seeberger, Lead Child and Youth Coordinator with the Washington National Guard Child & Youth Services. "The whole family is involved in the

Washington National Guard Child & Youth Services across the state of Washington. They assist with our summer and winter camps, regional events, and various training opportunities."

"Being a military family with a spouse who may be deployed really teaches you resilience, but also helps you empathize with other military families who need help," said Nohelia. "My husband and I have tried to teach our children to give back and help those who need that extra support."

Duskin received the WASA Community Leadership Award for Arlington Public Schools. She has served on the Arlington School Board for 20 years, including eight years as board president. Her commitment



and dedication to the students, staff and community of Arlington is exceptional in every way. Duskin regularly volunteers her time in Arlington schools and is very connected with students, staff and families.

### Kathy Ehman-Retired Assistant Superintendent, Arlington Public Schools

Ehman received the WASA Student Achievement Award for Arlington Public Schools. Ehman is an amazing leader who has inspired the implementation of multiple innovations which are increasing student achievement in Arlington.

One of these innovations is the Open Doors Program for students 16-21 who are significantly credit deficient or have dropped out of school. Ehman's vision and leadership have made this program of hope available for over 50 students to date.

"We are so pleased to be able to offer this choice for students who would otherwise be lost to the school system," said Ehman. "There is nothing more rewarding than to see a student who struggles be successful."

"Kathy and I are very honored to receive these awards," said Duskin. "Volunteering in our schools is such a rewarding experience. Duskin and Ehman received the awards during WASA's annual awards luncheon May 9 in Everett.

While he wasn't selected as the classified school employee of the year, he was honored at a recent board meeting and humbled to be nominated.

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
### **Arlington Proud!**
